SASO Unveils 'Manih' Platform as Digital Successor to 'Jeem1' Effective January 2026



The Saudi Standards, Metrology and Quality Organization (SASO) has announced a major upgrade to its digital certification infrastructure. Effective January 2026, the current "Jeem1" platform will be officially replaced by the new "Manih" platform. This transition is part of SASO's ongoing commitment to advancing digital governance and enhancing the user experience for stakeholders.

SASO clarified that the "Manih" platform will serve as the primary gateway for all certification services. Access to the new system will be integrated exclusively via the Electronic Authorization Service for local establishments, issued by the Saudi Business Center (SBC). The Organization emphasized that obtaining this electronic authorization is a mandatory prerequisite for businesses to access the platform's services and ensure a seamless transition.

Operated under the supervision of the General Department of Certification, the "Manih" platform is a state-of-the-art digital system designed to centralize and manage all certification procedures. Key functionalities include:

- Issuance of the Saudi Quality Mark.
- Provision of conformity marks and labels verifying product adherence to approved standard specifications and technical regulations.
- National Recognition Certificates (IECEE).

The launch of "Manih" aligns with the Kingdom's broader digital transformation objectives. By streamlining administrative procedures and simplifying the certification journey for beneficiaries, SASO aims to increase operational efficiency, meet the evolving demands of the Saudi market, and uphold the highest standards of quality and compliance.

SFDA Mandates Country-of-Origin Conformity Certificates for Specific Food Categories

The Saudi Food and Drug Authority (SFDA) has issued an official circular updating the list of food products required to obtain a Certificate of Conformity (CoC) based on food category and country of origin. This measure is part of the Authority's ongoing mission to ensure the safety of imported goods and their strict adherence to approved technical regulations.

The revised mandate introduces specific compliance protocols for imports from Brazil and the United Arab Emirates:

Brazil: All poultry and poultry products must originate exclusively from SFDA-approved facilities. Importers must comply with the technical annex regarding shipment conformity certificates as outlined in the Requirements Manual for the Designation of Conformity Assessment Bodies.

United Arab Emirates: The requirement applies specifically to infant and follow-on formula. Consignments must adhere to the technical annex for food product shipment conformity in accordance with the officially approved manual.

The SFDA confirmed that these updated requirements will be strictly enforced starting April 2026. Importers and stakeholders are encouraged to review the updated lists and technical manuals available on the Authority's official website to ensure regulatory compliance before the deadline.



SFDA and Food Industries Institute Ink Strategic Training and Capacity-Building Agreement

The Saudi Food and Drug Authority (SFDA) has signed a strategic Memorandum of Cooperation (MoC) with the Food Industries Institute (FII). This partnership aims to strengthen joint efforts to train and qualify national talent, while building specialized human capital in fields relevant to both entities' mandates.

The memorandum establishes a comprehensive framework for cooperation, designed to bolster food safety and uphold the highest quality standards within the Kingdom's food manufacturing sector. Under the agreement, the two parties will develop qualitative training programs and vocational qualification solutions tailored to the evolving needs of the industry.

The initiative aligns with the SFDA's leading role in regulating and monitoring the food and drug sectors to safeguard public health and safety. Furthermore, the collaboration underscores the Authority's commitment to:

- Enhancing the operational readiness of food industry facilities.
- Preparing Saudi job seekers with specialized skills to enter the workforce.
- Supporting the Kingdom's broader objectives for industrial growth and workforce localization.

By bridging the gap between academic training and regulatory requirements, this partnership is set to accelerate the development of a highly skilled workforce capable of maintaining Saudi Arabia's position as a regional leader in food quality and safety.
